

Style of house: A Queenslander worker's cottage in Brisbane's inner suburbs.

OUTDOORS "The outdoor deck is an extension of the home," says owner Jacqueline, with daughter Ines. Having renovated their Sydney apartment before becoming renters in Brisbane, the space had to be just as beautifully finished, but with the bonus of green space. **HALLWAY** (opposite) Handbags from Jacqueline's new label, Plus Equals, reflect her love of simplicity. "We kept taking off any unnecessary hardware or embellishment," she says. "It was about simplifying until you get back to its purest form."



Life was good in the idyllic Brisbane of Jacqueline Kaytar's childhood. Family was at the heart of it, with her grandparents sharing stories of the past in the 'good room'. There was always a gang of local kids to ride bikes with, tadpole catching took all afternoon and the bush was a wild whisper away.

It's a much more stylised, urbanised patch of inner Brisbane that she's returned to with husband Oscar and baby daughter Ines after 15 years in Sydney, but the idea of returning to a simple innocence permeates the space.

"I wanted to pare back," says Jacqueline. "What immediately got me about this home was that it was renovated beautifully. With the Japan black floors, all the tongue-and-groove walls and the exposed beams, it's kind of in its raw essence."


The 'great bones' are thanks to local interior design firm Georgia Cannon, who reworked the old worker's cottage to be a rental without skimping on good design. Three bedrooms and a bathroom sit at the front, with an open living and kitchen area spilling out to a leafy outdoor space through expansive bi-fold doors.
